ABOUT THE BOOK:

In this hilariously sweet story about an opposites-attract friendship, chock-full of Yiddish humor, a girl and her best bird friend's perfect day turns into a perfect opportunity to see things differently.

Gitty and her feathered-friend Kvetch couldn't be more different: Gitty always sees the bright side of life, while her curmudgeonly friend Kvetch is always complaining and, well, kvetching about the trouble they get into. One perfect day, Gitty ropes Kvetch into shlepping off on a new adventure to their perfect purple treehouse. Even when Kvetch sees signs of impending doom everywhere, Gitty finds silver linings and holds onto her super special surprise reason for completing their mission. But when her perfect plan goes awry, oy vey, suddenly it's Gitty who's down in the dumps. Can Kvetch come out of his funk to lift Gitty's spirits back up?

PRE-READING DISCUSSION:

Consider the illustration on the cover of the book:

- The word *enthusiastic* means energetic, excitement, and joyful. Identify which character in the illustration appears to be enthusiastic. How do you know?
- The word *skeptical* is defined as doubtful, suspicious, and not believing. Which character seems to be skeptical? Explain your answer.
- Study the background of the illustration. Notice that there are bright flowers behind the girl and dark clouds above the bird. What do the flowers and clouds suggest about the characters?
- Illustrators tell stories with pictures. What is the story this illustration is telling?

POST-READING DISCUSSION:

That's right, today! It's PERFECT!

- Gitty swirls and swoops as she creates her painting. What do these actions reveal about her character? Describe Gitty's personality.
- Rather than using words like *nice* or *special*, tell why Gitty repeatedly chooses the word *perfect* to describe the world around her?
- Gitty describes several things as being *perfect* her painting, the day, and the purple tree house. Explain how all of these things can be *perfect*.
- How does Gitty feel about Kvetch? How do you know?

Haven't you heard of the calm before the storm?

- The term *point of view* refers to the way a character interprets situations or ideas. It appears that Kvetch's point of view regarding the perfection of the day is very different from Gitty's. Explain why this is so.
- Notice that Kvetch has a band aid on his beak. What do you think happened to Kvetch? Do you think Gitty had something to do with the injury? Does the bandaid have something to do with Kvetch's point of view? How so?

It's the soggiest, runniest, most miserable painting possible.

- Early in the story, Gitty was lively and energetic. Yet, when she discovered that her painting had been *ruined* by the rain, she became miserable and sad. What caused Gitty's point of view to change so suddenly?
- Describe how Gitty's disappointment affected Kvetch. Explain why Kvetch, who was once quite gloomy and drab, seems desperate to find a way to lift Gitty's spirits. What inspired the change in Kvetch?

Perfect is you and me.

- The word *kindness* means understanding, thoughtfulness, and caring. Identify ways that Kvetch demonstrated these attributes toward Gitty. What was Kvetch's motivation to do so? Explain your answer.
- Examine Kvetch's description of the word *perfect*. Explore how, instead of depending on outward events, *perfect* is an inward feeling of love, caring and friendship.

APPLICATION:

Consider each quote printed in the arrow boxes by closely observing the illustrations depicted in each spread. Determine each characters' point of view in each scene. Analyze Gitty and Kvetch reactions, feelings, or motivations during each moment of the story. Describe their differing points of view through writing or illustration in the boxes provided. Share your work with the class.
